International Red Cross Red Crescent Movement holds statutory meetings in Sydney to discuss the future of humanitarian action

4 November 2013, Geneva — Members of the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement will gather from **8** to **18 November 2013** at the Sydney Convention and Exhibition Centre in Australia for its bi-annual statutory meetings.

The meetings bring together the leaders of the Red Cross Red Crescent Movement from all 187 National Societies, the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC) and the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) to discuss today's humanitarian challenges and determine the future path of the Movement.

9 & 10 November, Saturday & Sunday:

• Global youth forum (9:00am - 5:00pm) - 200 young leaders from across the world will convene to solidify the role of youth in directing positive change in their local and global communities and in shaping the development agenda post-2015.

11 November, Monday:

Photo opportunity: Giant cross and crescent formation at the Sydney Opera House
 (12:30pm - 12:50pm) – Hundreds of volunteers dressed in red will form a giant Red Cross
 and Red Crescent in front of the Sydney Opera House, highlighting the significance of these
 emblems. Senior representatives from the Australian Red Cross, IFRC and ICRC will be
 present at the photo opportunity.

Joint press briefing on the Syria crisis and humanitarian response (1:45pm - 2:45pm)

 The Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement are at the forefront of humanitarian efforts in response to the crisis in Syria. For the first time, the senior leadership of the IFRC, ICRC and National Red Crescent Societies in the region will give a joint briefing to the media highlighting the grave humanitarian situation and critical needs in the country, the challenges

of humanitarian access in Syria, their concerns over the safety of Red Crescent volunteers and health workers working on the frontlines and the plight of more than two million Syrians who have fled to neighbouring countries.

Panellists will be available for one-on-one interviews following the press briefing.

12 November, Tuesday:

Opening ceremony (9:00am - 1.00pm) - The official opening ceremony of the 2013 statutory meetings will commemorate the 150th anniversary of the founding of the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement. Based on their unique experiences and insights from different contexts, a panel of notable keynote speakers will discuss and debate the past, present and future direction of humanitarian action.

The panel discussion will close with a question and answer session which will include questions generated from within the room, through social media channels (#rcrc2013) and from National Society members in advance.

13 November, Wednesday:

Press briefing with the newly elected IFRC President (12:30pm - 13:30) - The 19th session of the IFRC's General Assembly will take place from 12 to 15 November. Elections will be held for the positions of the IFRC's President, four Vice Presidents and twenty National Society Governing Board members.

The election result for the position of the IFRC President will be announced on 13 November. Members of the media are invited to a press briefing with the elected President.

14 November, Thursday:

ARC and ICRC special event on the challenges of delivering medical care in times of conflict (5:30pm – 6:30pm) – During this public event, an international panel of experts will share their strong field experience and explain why this issue is critical. This problem will be illustrated by a destroyed ambulance located at the entrance of the conference hall. A new publication on "Ambulances and Pre-Hospital Services in Risk Situation" published by the Mexican Red Cross, the Norwegian Red Cross and the ICRC will be officially launched on that day.

15 November, Friday:

• Press briefing on the outcome of the post-2015 Millennium Development Goals plenary session (1:00pm – 2:00pm) – The United Nations Millennium Development Goals (MDGS) will expire at the end of 2015. The ongoing process among states to define what is currently called the 'post-2015 development agenda' will shape the future for people, communities, countries and humanitarian work over the next 20 to 30 years. As an Observer at the United Nations General Assembly, the IFRC has participated in the key and relevant intergovernmental discussions on the post-2015 agenda. The IFRC believes that this agenda must take into account the needs, rights and views of individuals, including the most vulnerable, with direct input from the people themselves.

Given the substantial involvement of National Societies in day-to-day developmental work, the IFRC has a responsibility to influence the shaping of the framework that will follow the MDGs so that it reflects the needs of the vulnerable people that the network serves.

At this press briefing a panel of spokespeople representing the IFRC leadership, Red Cross Red Crescent youth and National Societies will present the aspirations and priorities of our youth, volunteers and beneficiaries globally, which will form the basis of the Red Cross and Red Crescent's dialogue and engagement with the international community on how the post-2015 development agenda should be shaped.

18 November:

Red Cross Red Crescent statutory meetings closing media conference: The future of humanitarian action (1:00pm - 2:00pm) – the Presidents of Australian Red Cross, the IFRC and ICRC will assemble for a joint media briefing on the final day of the meetings. Each will give a statement on the evolving trends in the humanitarian and development sectors and offer perspectives on how the Red Cross Red Crescent Movement can meet current and future challenges in order to remain relevant in addressing the humanitarian needs of vulnerable communities.
